COURSE NAME

A101-B114 Introduction to Hermeneutics (Electronic)

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The student will be introduced to a range of concepts, tools and methods useful for personal Bible study and a deeper dive for grasping Scripture in its original context. The emphasis of this course is found in scripture, namely 2 Timothy 2:15 Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. KJV, along with many other passages. This course underscores the importance of deliberate, diligent and systematic study of God's Word with application. As you learn better do better.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the end of this course you will be able to:

- Identify a systematic approach to in-depth Bible Study applying techniques of hermeneutics
- List components of in-depth study of God's Word and extrapolate from truths previously unobserved
- Use specific tools that assist in proper study, understanding and application of scriptural passages.
- Describe what "rightly dividing the Word of truth" entails.

BASIC OUTLINE

Lectures will consist of multiple segments in the online audio recorded format that will be accessible 24/7. They may be accessed on any computer, tablet or Smartphone. Additionally, documents and audio

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files may be downloaded. This will include a weekly phone conference with the professor each Saturday and at least one additional phone contact during the week relating to Intro to Hermeneutics.

METHODOLOGY

Therefore, because of the growing problem of Plagiarism on college campuses all over the country the following policy shall be adopted by all students of BCROC when writing a research paper:

- 1. All cited material used in a student's research paper must be properly footnoted.
- 2. A Bibliography must be included with the research paper for all cited material.
- 3. Any student using information from the Internet, must not only properly cite the information, using the proper format for footnoting information from the Internet. But, they must also provide a copy of the article, with the cited material underlined or highlighted, and places it in an appendix at the end of the research paper.
- 4. Any student failing to provide the proper documentation of information used, and failing to provide a copy of an Internet article in the appendix of their paper Will Not Receive Credit For The Project.
