Why this Topic is Important

Many jails/prisons are engaged in reform of segregation practices.

Some staff do not understand reasons for reform and/or want to continue using segregation.

Science suggests segregation in carceral settings may do more harm than good.

Key Episode Takeaways

- ✓ Segregation in prisons does not positively contribute to rehabilitation and reformation of individuals who are incarcerated.
- ✓ Restricted housing increases the challenges incarcerated individuals face both during segregation and post-release.
- ✓ A case study of North Dakota's restricted housing reform (based on the Norwegian Correctional Service), documented significant reductions in the usage of restricted housing post-reform and found that the reform helped with in-custody violence.
