The First Epistle of Paul to the Corinthians

Be Mature in Your Thinking

1 Corinthians 14:20

1. The Problem of **Childish Thinking**

The Corinthians were manifesting their spiritual immaturity in how they were handling the operation of the gifts of the Spirit in their congregation (1 Cor 12:14ff). Paul has already chided the Corinthians for their childishness when instead they ought to have already been mature (1 Cor. 3:1; Heb. 5:14). Someone in this state is able to be taught and corrected (cf. Prov. 9:4), but without an intentional correction, this naive foolishness can lead to ruin (cf. Prov. 6:32; 15:21; 18:2).

2. The Importance of being Innocent of Evil

It is vital for the Christian to remain an innocent child in the ways of evil while becoming wise in the Lord. We can maintain innocence in regard to evil by mortifying a sinful desire for things of this world (Matt 6:19; 1 Thess 6:10) and by refraining to respond in kind to the wicked things we experience (1 Thess 5:15; 1 Pet. 3:9-12; cf. Phil 3:18-19). We are not to dwell upon those things which are evil or which lend themselves to evil (Job 31:1; Rom. 8:5-9) but instead to dwell on what is good (Phil 4:8-9; Col. 3:2).

3. The Imperative for **Continuing Maturity**

All believers ought to grow in their spiritual understanding (cf. 1 Cor. 13:11) because spiritual maturity enables us to have wisdom to discern good from evil (cf. Heb. 5:14). The local church is one of the primary means of grace which God has given to accomplish this result in us (Eph 4:11-14; Heb. 10:24-25; cf. Prov. 18:1-2; Rom 12:3; 2 Cor. 10:12).
