### **The Seventh Trumpet Sounds**

Revelation 11:15-19

1. \_\_\_\_\_  
The seventh trumpet is the latest in a series of God's activity and His judgment upon the earth and upon the unbelievers who live there (cf. Rev. 6:1ff). The seven bowls of God's wrath are yet to come (Rev. 16:1ff) as is the final rebellion of sinful men following the millennial reign of Christ upon the earth (Rev. 20:7ff). Though there is much yet that must occur, those in the heavens respond with praise as if all of the future actions have already been accomplished (1 Cor. 15:54-58).
  
2. \_\_\_\_\_  
The Characteristic response of the elders (Rev. 4:10) and of the rest of the heavenly chorus (Rev. 4:8; 5:11, 13) is praise and thanksgiving (cf. Rev. 4:8, 11; 5:9, 10). The praise that we see in this section is of what God is yet to do (see v.18; cf. Eph 1:13-14). This heavenly exultation proclaims the power that Christ will assuredly display in the destruction of His enemies and in the rewarding of His servants (cf. Ps. 2:1-6; Matt 25:31-33).

The culmination of this scene in heaven (cf. Rev. 12:1) is John's vision of the heavenly reality after which God patterned the designs of the tabernacle and the other holy things used in divine worship (cf. Heb. 9:23-24). The way in which God manifests His presence in this vision also brings to mind the first time He revealed Himself to the nation (Ex. 19:18-20; 20:18-21).
